

Councillor Blog

Welcome back fellow residents of White City (and those reading from the surrounding area) for the May 2024 edition of the White City Councillor Blog. This month's blog will focus on Emergency Preparedness Week (May 5 to 11, 2024), what types of emergencies our community is vulnerable to, and provide you with some tips on how you can prepare for an emergency.

From blizzards and severe storms to wildfires and floods, our landscape presents unique challenges that require proactive preparedness and swift response. Let's take a moment to explore some of the potential emergencies we may encounter:

- 1. Severe Weather Events: We know Saskatchewan weather conditions can quickly become extreme, including blizzards, thunderstorms, and high winds or tornadoes. These events can cause widespread damage, power outages, and transportation disruptions that would warrant an emergency response.
- 2. Floods: Heavy rainfall or rapid snowmelt can lead to localized flooding, affecting homes, roads, and infrastructure.
- **3. Pandemics and Epidemics:** If there's one thing the COVID-19 pandemic taught us, it's that being prepared is an essential part of managing an emergency. Epidemics and pandemics call for isolation orders that may require individuals to self-sustain themselves for days at a time.
- **4. Human-Made Disasters:** While less common, incidents such as chemical spills, bomb threats, transportation accidents, or industrial incidents can pose significant risks to public safety and the environment.



As we prepare for Emergency Preparedness Week, it's essential to recognize the potential hazards we face and take proactive measures to mitigate risks and ensure our community's safety. This includes having a comprehensive emergency plan in place, assembling emergency kits, and staying informed about local emergency protocols and resources.

Utilizing Technology in Emergencies

In today's digital age, technology plays a crucial role in keeping us connected. During emergencies, these tools become even more vital in helping us communicate and stay informed. Here are some tips to maximize the use of technology during such times:

- Opt for non-voice channels like text messaging, email, or social media as they consume less bandwidth and may remain functional when voice communications fail.
- Sign up for our Voyent Alert! System to receive emergency alerts via text message or phone call.
- If using a phone, keep conversations brief and convey only essential information to conserve battery and reduce network congestion.

- Keep a charger for your mobile device in your emergency kit and consider alternative power sources like solar-powered or crank chargers.
- Maintain updated contacts on your phone and other channels for easy communication with important contacts.
- Conserve your smartphone's battery by adjusting settings and closing unnecessary apps.

Remember, to report an emergency, call 9-1-1 for help. Our first responders in the community work around the clock to assist residents and save lives. For non-emergencies, contact the White Butte RCMP by calling 306-781-5050, or the Town Office at 306-781-2355.

Preparing Your 72-Hour Kit

In an emergency, being self-sufficient for at least 72 hours is crucial. Here's what you'll need:

- Basic supplies such as food, water, and a batteryoperated flashlight should be organized and easily accessible.
- Store your emergency kit in a portable container like a backpack or suitcase with wheels for easy transport.
- Consider personalizing grab-and-go kits for each household member to ensure everyone's needs are met.
- Keep your emergency kit in a readily accessible location, such as your front-hall closet.

To further support our community's preparedness efforts, we'll be giving away a 72-hour emergency kit on our social media platforms! Stay tuned on our Instagram and Facebook pages for details on how to participate.

Community Preparedness

While the Town of White City's Emergency Measures Organization (EMO) Committee is continuously training and preparing for disasters, we need our residents to be equally prepared. By taking proactive steps to assemble emergency kits and staying informed about technology usage during emergencies, we can ensure our community's resilience in the face of adversity.

Council Summaries

April 2, 2024 - Committee of the Whole

The Consent Agenda, comprising of Committee Meeting Minutes and Payroll and Accounts Ratification, was approved without discussion. Department Reports were presented, covering Business Operations, Public Works and Parks, Recreation and Culture activities. Notable points included plans for tree planting along the TransGas pipeline, completion of Splash Park upgrades, and considerations for the Summer Sizzle event based on public feedback. The Violence Prevention Policy was discussed, with focus on insurance coverage, and reporting procedures. The Committee requested to amend the policy have two positions added to the list of persons protected by this policy and for additional information on how it applies to first responders. The policy, including amendments, was recommended to Council for approval. The meeting then moved into a closed session to discuss Department Reports, concluding with no further resolutions or discussions.



April 2, 2024 - Regular Council Meeting

The Consent Agenda, including minutes and accounts, was approved without discussion. The Town Manager report was presented and Council approved the report with no discussion. New Business included two items: The Fire Training Grounds and Council Renumeration. Having generated \$10.0K in rental revenues, the Fire Training Grounds was discussed and Council considered reinvesting these earnings into infrastructure updates, this was approved due to its positive revenue generation and potential for growth. Council members also discussed and ultimately denied a raise in Council Remuneration. Two bylaws were addressed and approved: Bylaw No. 703-24 for long-term borrowing related to the WCRM158 Wastewater Authority's project and Chuka Ponds development, and Bylaw No. 704-24, replacing an old Curfew Bylaw, which was passed unanimously. During the roundtable, councillors provided updates from various community meetings. The closed session resulted in two resolutions: awarding Waste Disposal Services RFP to Loraas Disposal South for five years and accepting a Confidential Business Case, directing administration to proceed with a project with a budget of \$7.5K.

Public Works

Spring clean up bins are scheduled for May 22-30, 2024 and will be located near the Splash Park on Lipsett Street.

Please do not overfill the bins, if the bin is full please hold on to your items. Public Works will be monitoring the bins and calling Loraas to arrange for pick up as soon as they're full. Overloading the bins causes delays in pick up and pulls our Public Works crew from other jobs to empty the overfilled bin before Loraas will empty the bins.

Prohibited items include:

- Concrete, shingles dirt and gravel
- Bulbs and light ballasts (These can be taken to K-Light Recycling in Regina)
- Hazardous materials
- Tires
- Propane tanks
- Car batteries
- Paint
- Oil or chemicals
- Items longer than 7 feet (wood or metal)
- Railway ties, telephone poles or creosote treated wood
- Coils of wire or banding
- Appliances containing Freon
- Box spring and mattresses

All bags must be paper bag only. Absolutely no plastic bags will be collected, including those that labeled biodegradable and compostable.

Please have bags neatly <mark>pi</mark>led at the edge of the property by Monday, May 20.


The Curfew Bylaw

A new Curfew Bylaw has been recently passed by Council to replace the old one.

Here's what's changed:

- The bylaw now only applies to children under 16;
- Adjustment of the curfew times between June and August (11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) and September and May (10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.) of each year; and
 - Clarification that enforcement of the bylaw is at the discretion of the Community Safety Officer.

Community Safety

Drive Safely, or Pay the Price Starting May 1, 2024, if you're caught stunting, racing,

Starting May 1, 2024, if you're caught stunting, racing, or speeding excessively (50km/h or more over, or more than double the posted limit), you'll face a 30-day vehicle impoundment and an immediate 7-day licence suspension.

- The penalty for stunting in a motor vehicle is \$580* (up from \$150*).
- The penalties for street racing escalate for repeat offences within a one-year period:
 - 1. First offence: \$580* (up from \$205*)
 - 2. Second offence: \$1,400*
 - Third and subsequent offences: \$2,100*
 *Ticket costs listed include base fine plus victims of crime surcharge.



Some of the things that could land you a ticket, licence suspension and impoundment under The Traffic Safety Act are:

- racing side by side with another vehicle while disobeying the speed limit
- chasing another vehicle
- speeding in and out of lanes to unsafely pass vehicles
- attempting to lift some or all tires from the roadway (including driving a motorcycle on one wheel)
- attempting to spin a vehicle to cause it to spin or circle
- driving a vehicle while not sitting in the driver's seat
- driving your vehicle in a way that prevents another vehicle from passing
- stopping or slowing down to interfere with the movement of another vehicle

When you drive faster than the speed limit, stunt, or race, you have less reaction time and are more likely to lose control of the vehicle you're driving. These high-risk behaviours increase your chance of getting into a collision. When you take part in these dangerous choices, you risk your own safety and the safety of other road users, including pedestrians and motorists. **Information provided by SGI.**



CSO Day in the Life Last month you met our new Community Safety Officer (CSO), Keagan! Since then, he has been working hard to engage with the community, educate residents and enforce bylaws. The CSO works varying hours throughout the week; sometimes covering evenings and weekends while other times working during the day.

Keagan will usually begin his shift in the Town Office responding to emails and calls that have come in from residents or internal communications, allowing him to plan his patrols for the day and priortize tasks. After managing tasks in the office, he heads out on patrol to enforce provincial statutes and bylaws such as the Traffic Safety Act and the Town of White City's Traffic Bylaw/Community Standards Bylaw.

Recently, Keagan's most frequent task has been enforcing

parking violations. As always, there is no on-street parking in White City, but did you know it is also a bylaw violation to park any vehicle on your property space that is not a driveway? Keagan has issued many warnings for cars parked on grass property and will continue to do so in the coming weeks. The best way to avoid a ticket? Ensure your vehicles are parked in a garage or on a driveway.

The CSO also responds to concerns and questions from residents on a daily basis and tries to resolve situations with the most reasonable solution for everyone involved.

Near the end of his shift, he returns to the office to complete end-of-day reporting and liase with supervisors to continuously find the best methods for resolving any given situation.
