6 home maintenance tasks to tackle before the winter arrives



Canadian winter weather can be unpredictable. That's why it's good practice to ensure that you and your home are ready for whatever rolls in with the cold temperatures.

Make sure your furnace is in good working order. Book a furnace inspection before winter hits. Wait times can be longer as we get deeper into the season, and that's the worst time to make do without.

As part of your winter prep, turn off the water supply to all outdoor taps and faucets, then open the taps to drain them completely. Leave the taps in the open position until spring. Disconnect garden hoses and drain them completely. Store them in a warm location so any residual water won't freeze.

Put away seasonal items. If you haven't already, put away your patio tables and chairs, as well as your barbecue, if you're not planning to use it through the win-

ter. Wash them with soapy water and dry them before storing. To avoid rust on barbecue grills, brush them with vegetable oil and place a grill protecter over them.

Prep your lawn system. Before the frost hits, you'll want to drain your lawn sprinkler or irrigation system and have a professional complete any required repairs. Make sure sprinkler heads are appropriately marked to avoid any costly mistakes during snow removal.

With these tips, you're well on your way to weather-proofing your home this winter. An up-cooked protein bowl that's a good sustainable choice

Reducing food waste is important, but it doesn't have to mean sacrificing taste or nutrition.

One delicious way to cut waste at home is upcooking: transforming leftovers into new dishes. Instead of tossing last night's dinner, try this hearty, protein-packed leftover bowl:

Leftover Chicken Harvest Bowl:

Prep time: 20 minutes Cook time: 35 minutes Makes: 4-6 servings

Ingredients:

- Leftover cooked chicken and roasted vegetables (or other available ingredients).
- ¼ cup (60 ml) olive oil
- 2 cups (500 ml) quinoa, cooked (or preferred cooked grains such as rice, barley, couscous, etc.)
- 1 tbsp (15 ml) balsamic vinegar (or dressing of choice)
- 1 lb (454 g) package baby spinach or kale
- 2 tbsp (30 ml) toasted nuts or seeds, finely chopped

Preparation:

- 1. Dice leftover chicken and roasted vegetables. Place into small mixing bowl.
- 2. Heat oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium high heat, stirring frequently for 2 to 3 minutes until just starting to brown and chicken is warmed through.
- 3. Add a handful of quinoa (or cooked grain of choice) and a splash of balsamic vinegar. Toss well.
- 4. Stir in fresh spinach or kale until wilted.
- 5. Garnish with toasted nuts or seeds for more crunch and extra protein.

This simple dish brings bold fall flavours to your table while keeping quality protein at the centre of your plate. One way to stay fueled during busy days without wasting food is to look at your fridge with fresh eyes. With a little creativity, yesterday's meal can become today's favourite. 



apartment complex Public Hearing was circulated to only those residents of Emerald Park living within 800 metres of the

project, excluding about half of the population. To repeat, thumbs on the scales.

The final (let us hope, for the sake of us beleaguered ratepayers) bills to the R.M. of Edenwold for the investigation/witch-hunt (no reflection on her) against councillor Posehn are in and paid. It has cost us \$53,559.90 for the Buckingham (ahem) investigation and \$6,693.30 for legal fees for a total of \$60,253.30.

Part of the legal advice was, for reasons best understood by four councillors, ignored when the same councillors who testified as witnesses against Posehn, then sat in judgment of her. It would seem reasonable to follow legal advice if one is going to retain the lawyer to give it. Apparently not, for four R.M. councillors.

From the Department of Putting a Thumb on the Scale come two stories. White City's October InSight magazine has a glowing two-page advertorial on the Townhomes of Royal Park which would do an expensive advertising agency proud. Except Royal Park didn't have to pay for it. White City wrote it themselves.

And in the R.M. of Edenwold, the official notification of the Greensview The little town of Fenelon Falls, Ontario has a population, according to the 2021 census, of just a whisker under 2,500. In other words, less than half of the combined populations of White City and Emerald Park (5,255).

Somehow it has been able to sustain six churches over the years. Some have been functioning for decades and in a couple of cases for more than a century. I'm not saying that the residents of Fenelon Falls are closer to salvation than the folks in our community because of the presence of these churches, or their range of options for church attendance. But it is indisputable that they are an integral part of the spiritual, cultural and social fabric of Fenelon Falls. The church suppers were legend and perhaps still are.

Here in White City/Emerald Park our choices for a bit of spiritual salvation are limited to, well, let's face it, Ambassadors for Christ Church or nothing at all, and we thank James and Rebecca Otitoju for their yeomanly service in that regard.

A resident of our local community has a line on a church within a hundred

or so kms from here that happens to be for sale, and for a fairly reasonable price. It could presumably be moved here and set down, assuming a suitable piece of ground could be acquired.

Off the Beaten Track

The only reason I mention this now is to gauge whether or not there is interest within our communities to get involved in a project of this nature. Presumably it could serve various denominations on a rotational basis, and, because there would be a sizable basement under it, it could function as a sort of community centre or a venue for "town hall" meetings. I've seen pho-

tos of the church and it is quite beautiful too.

I'll start the conversation by saying I think it's a good idea.





How to navigate all those holiday deals

The holiday shopping season can be the perfect time to get a deal on wireless, internet or TV services, but it's easy to get swept up in the excitement. Avoid making a purchase decision you may later regret by following some simple tips:

Do your research. Stay confident and in control by looking into what options are available before you go out to buy anything. Going to service provider or retailer websites is a great way to compare different products and packages, as well as compare between providers.

Keep a record of what you find, through notes or even screenshots. This can help you be confident in what exact terms providers are advertising, when it's time to buy.

Avoid the rush. Another advantage to researching in advance is that you'll probably know what you want before any shopping rushes start. Many providers have early bird pricing, and many offer extended deals after rush periods die down.

Review everything, before and after purchase. Always review the service documents before agreeing to anything, to avoid running into surprises later. If any of the information is unclear, ask questions. Some important things to check:

- Early termination fees and how they're calculated.
- The details of any device financing plans.
- If the listed price is a timelimited promotion or discount, and what the regular price is.



• If the terms of service let your provider increase prices or add service charges. Know your rights. Remember that you also have the right to a trial period when buying wireless services. As long as you haven't used more than half your monthly usage, you can cancel your contract and return the device without penalty within 15 days.

Once your service starts, check your contracts and bills to make sure they match what you agreed to. If they don't, you can reach out to your service provider to fix the problem.

If your provider doesn't resolve the issue to your satisfaction, you still have options. You can lodge a complaint with the Commission for Complaints for Telecom-Television Services (CCTS). They're an independent agency that handles unresolved wireless, TV and internet service issues from thousands of Canadians each year.


