#### 4 Health-Care Considerations for Autumn

For many, fall is their favourite time of year. The bugs are gone, the leaves are turning colours and the holidays are on the horizon. But it's also the start of cold and flu season. With that in mind, here are four healthcare issues to be aware of at this time of year.

#### What is eczema?

Atopic dermatitis, commonly known as eczema, is a chronic skin condition that, according to Eczema Society of Canada, affects 11 per cent of children and 7 per cent of adults in this country. Its symptoms can range from mild dry, itchy skin to more severe widespread skin rashes, debilitating pain and psychological impacts. It is not contagious, and there is currently no cure. However, multiple medical treatments are available, ranging from moisturizing and skin care to prescription treatments. eczemahelp.ca

#### Did you know that diabetes is linked to heart and kidney disease?

Type 2 diabetes can increase your risk of developing heart or kidney disease. Steps you can take to protect your health include regular medical screening

for heart disease and kidney disease. Consuming a balanced, nutritious diet and getting regular exercise are other factors that reduce the risks of heart and kidney complications. Medications may also lower your risk of dying from heart problems and can help treat kidney disease. itsconnected.ca

#### Is COVID here to stay?

We may have moved out of the COVID-19 pandemic, but COVID-19 hasn't gone away. With pandemic-era guidelines and restrictions widely removed across Canada, COVID-19 is still circulating and evolving.

It's important to remember that preventative measures, like vaccination, are highly recommended. Even if you've received your initial COVID-19 vaccine in the past, protection wanes over time. Help protect yourself and others this fall – speak with a qualified health-care professional or visit your local pharmacy about getting an updated COVID-19 vaccine.

#### What is respiratory syncytial virus?

Respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, can affect the respiratory system, including the nose, throat and lungs. In most people, the virus will present like a cold, but in some people it can be dangerous because it can cause severe infections like pneumonia or bronchiolitis.

Talk to your health-care provider if you don't feel better after a week. You can also consider using a virtual care service, such as Maple, to consult with doctors or nurse practitioners from the comfort of your home. getmaple.ca

# A sweet, savoury and sustainable dessert

force Canadians indoors, but it can also encourage more eco-friendly and costsaving practices like eating in.

Next time you want to cozy up with your special someone, consider adding this sweet, savoury and ecofriendly dessert to your date night menu. This recipe can also be made in bulk so you can share the love with friends and family and "upcook" your leftover ingredients in tomorrow's date-night snack.

#### **Marbled Bacon Walnut Bark**

Prep time: 10 minutes

Cook time: 40 + 30 minutes chilling

Makes: 12-20 pieces

#### **Ingredients:**

6 slices of Maple Leaf Original Bacon

- 1 250 g bag good quality bittersweet chocolate chips
- 1 225 g good quality pure white chocolate chips
- 2 tbsp (30 ml) toast walnuts or pecans, finely chopped

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400°F (205°C).
- 2. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and lay six slices of bacon flat. Cook on centre rack of oven for 15 to 20 minutes or until completely crisp and golden brown. Remove onto a cooling rack and blot bacon with paper towel completely on both sides. Set aside to cool.
- 3. Pour bittersweet chocolate and white chocolate into two separate microwavable glass bowls. Set aside white chocolate for later. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper. Microwave bittersweet chocolate for 35- to 40-second intervals, stirring each time until chocolate has melted. Be careful not to overheat and burn the chocolate during the last interval reduce time to ensure smooth melted chocolate.
- 4. Using a rubber spatula to pour the chocolate onto prepared a baking sheet.
- 5. Using an offset spatula, spread the chocolate into the shape of a square, being careful not to spread it too thin.
- 6. Repeat heating steps for white chocolate.
- 7. Spoon dollops of white chocolate all over the bittersweet chocolate. Drag your rubber spatula in a zig-zag pattern across the chocolate.
- 8. On a clean surface, chop cooled bacon into fine pieces and immediately sprinkle evenly over marbled chocolate. Sprinkle the nuts over the top and softly



press down any toppings that do not adhere to the chocolate bark with the back of a clean spoon.

9. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. Once completely chilled, use a butter knife to crack the bark into the desired number of pieces. Enjoy right away or place in an airtight container and refrigerate for up to one week.

There is a practice that has the power to sabotage communication and relationships. We all do it or have done it. It is so prevalent in the way we think about others that we are scarcely aware we are violating others when we do it. It is like a computer virus that has the potential to disable all of our programs.

What could it be? It is when we make assumptions about what others are thinking. How often sentences begin with, "you think", "she thinks", "they think", or even, "everyone thinks". It is not an assumption when you report directly and accurately what another has said. Telling someone your preschooler thinks there are monsters under the bed may be a statement of fact, if that is what she told you. However, to say that your teenager thinks everyone should pick up after him, because he never puts anything away, is an assumption, unless he actually made that statement.

Statements such as, "You think you can just walk all over me", "You think the world revolves around you", or "You just don't care", are actually very invasive, hostile and judgmental. It

is hard for the recipient of such messages to respond in any reasonable way. Denial of the allegation generally invites further judgments, as the speaker tries to prove his or her assumption is accurate. Saving, for example, that he does care, may cause the speaker to cite a litany of examples "proving" that he does not. Unable to respond reasonably, the one attacked may resort to tossing out a few assumptions of his own, reacting angrily, or simply walking away. Of course, this "proves" to the initiator

that she was right all along. Right? Wrong!

This is what we call crazy-making. It distorts the communication process and takes on a life of its own. We must let others speak for themselves. We honor them when we take the time to ask what their thoughts and feelings are. We must accept what they say as their truth. There is simply no point in arguing with someone about what they think, because we cannot get into their heads.

If there is any doubt in your mind about how this

affects others, just try to remember a time when someone either told you what you thought, or otherwise insisted he knew more about what is in your head than you did. It is to communication what a red flag is to a bull.

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Buffalo Park is a hiking trail in Flagstaff, Arizona. Along its 2.2 mile loop, ending where it begins, joggers or walkers can stop at a goodly number of gymnastic apparatuses to indulge in, what the Flagstaff website describes as, "exercise challenges". The hiking path running through Kuzmicz Park north of Kingsmere Avenue, while not as long or scenic as the Flagstaff trail, also provides a half-dozen or so metal structures of unusual configuration.

They seem to be neither kids' play structures, nor anything pertaining to exercise, nor could they be considered art. Perhaps they are a hybrid of all three but useful as none.

Admittedly, one of them might be a chinning bar which could provide some useful exercise, but another could only be described as a non-horizontal chinning bar, except that the bar isn't round, but rectangular in cross-section, which makes supporting one's weight from it a challenge to the hands.

cise challenges" in this park, maybe with instructions as to their use? They could check with Flagstaff for how to do it right. Exercise buffs would be grateful.

The ritualistic land acknowledgment which begins each White City council meeting makes reference to the original inhabitants of Treaty Four lands, including the Metis Nation. The first Metis children born here were the offspring of Indigenous mothers and European fathers, the fur traders, canoe paddlers or explorers who settled here two hundred or more years ago.

Which means that a European occupant of this part of the country predated the first Metis child by at least nine months.

So where's the acknowledgment of this ignored group? Probably in the same place as the Assiniboine, who roamed these plains and signed Treaty Four but are nowhere to be found in the land acknowledgment.

\*\*\*\*\*\*

Would it be fair to say that the male of the species is losing interest in writing books these days? A quick, admittedly unscientific, analysis of the fiction offerings at the White City library would seem to bear out this observation.

This is in no way a criticism of the library staff who, without exception, are friendly, personable and helpful to library patrons.

But a random scan of about 100 feet of rows of books in the fiction section reveals that 419 of 615 books, (68%), were written by female authors.

It should be noted that to analyze the books on the bottom row of shelves (where perhaps lurk male fiction-writers) would have necessitated lying prone on the floor; not something I was inclined to do, even in the interest of scholarly research.

This may prove absolutely nothing, and it may be a "good thing". (I'll see your James Patterson and raise you two Danielle Steeles).

I have no explanation for the phenomenon nor do I have a theory. These are just facts.

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


#### Walk Down Memory Lane


The staff and students are so appreciative of the community support they continue to receive and look forward to next year's event.
