DIY investing 101: How to get started

Self-directed or do-it-yourself (DIY) investing is an approach where you manage your investments yourself, giving you autonomy and control over what you buy and sell, and when.

There are plenty of DIY or self-directed investing platforms on the market. but Canadians may lack the necessary knowledge and support to set, track and achieve their financial goals.

However, DIY investing apps, such as TD Easy Trade, are designed to help investors set financial goals and then build the confidence to achieve them.

Here are some tips to help you get started.

Start investing as soon as you're ready

Smaller investments (less than \$100 per month) are a great way to start. Many types of low-cost investments allow you to invest your money slowly over time, which works especially well if you're working toward long-term goals.

Set investment goals and stick to your plan

Investment goals are unique and specific to you, so they vary from one investor to the next. But every investor should be thinking about the end at the beginning.

A common misconception is that an investment goal needs to be a purchase, like a car or a house. But investing goals can also be monetary goals, such as having a regular stream of money coming in.

There are a few common questions you'll want to ask yourself when goal setting: What is your time horizon? Are your goals short (1-2 years), medium (2-5 years) or long-term (5+ years)? Are your goals fixed or flexible? How you answer these questions will impact how you invest.

Know what kind of investor you are before you start

Before you start investing, you'll want to determine your risk tolerance, which is how much you can afford to lose without impacting vour financial well-being. combined with how comfortable you are with taking risks in general.

Additionally, consider diversifying your investments across different asset classes to help mitigate risk. Diversification is an investment strategy where the investor's portfolio contains various assets that aligns to their risk profile. A diversified portfolio contains a mix of investments (i.e., stocks, commodities, bonds, etc.) that may react differently to the same economic event.

Do your homework

There's a lot of information – and misinformation - out there when it comes to investing. It can be overwhelming for new investors to sift through the noise, so it's important to do your homework first.

Get historical



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Host an eco-friendly summer soiree with this planet-friendly summer salad

One of the most delicious things about summer is a seasonal salad that you can feel good about eating. Bonus points if it helps the planet.

You can do that with this recipe by choosing local blueberries, or foraging for them, and adding bacon from a carbon-neutral food company. Cheers to a mouthwatering meal, perfect for an eco-friendly summer soiree.

Bacon, Broccoli and Blueberry Salad

Prep time: 5 to 15 minutes Makes: 4 to 6 servings

Ingredients:

375 g Maple Leaf Lazy Maple Natural Bacon, chopped into ¾-inch pieces
200 g broccoli florets, blanched and cooled
1 pint (0.6 L) of blueberries
1/3 cup (80 ml) feta, crumbled
2 tbsp (30 ml) slivered almonds, toasted

Dressing:

¼ cup (60 ml) extra virgin olive oil 2 tbsp (30 ml) honey 3 tbsp (45 ml) apple cider vinegar ½ tbsp (7.5 ml) bacon grease Salt and pepper, to taste

Directions:

- 1. Heat skillet over medium-high heat. Cook bacon, stirring frequently until just crisp, about 4 to 6 minutes. Move onto paper towel-lined platter. Reserve ½ tbsp (15mL) of bacon grease.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine all the ingredients for the dressing and whisk well.
- Add broccoli, blueberries, feta and half the bacon to a large bowl and drizzle dressing over top. Toss well to coat.
- 4. Garnish with remaining bacon, almonds and extra feta if desired.

Tip: Make it ahead. Double the recipe for the dressing and keep in an airtight container for up to a week. Find more summer recipes at mapleleaf. ca/recipes.

An infant does not have language, and the only way to show discomfort is to cry. Most parents do their darndest to figure out what the child needs. Even before they have language, they can turn their heads away if they do not want what is on the spoon the parent is offering.

Language develops as the infant grows. They are also tuned in to facial expressions and body language.

The reason they learn to say "no" is because parents have used that word a lot with them. They know what it means.

Somewhere between the ages of 2 and 4, children will begin to exercise their own wills. This is a normal and healthy development; however, when the child's will is in opposition to the parent's desires, problems may arise.

Sometimes parents see this as the beginning of defiance and try to force the issue of compliance. Naturally, force begets force, and the child may resist just as strongly as the parent insists. However, the parents need to train the child to "do as I say" at an early age, conflicts with their


mean business, and we can convey this with a firm voice tone. We do not need to yell or hit. Children can be given the choice of co-operating or being taken to their room. To frighten a child into co-operating undermines the integrity of the parent/child relationship.

> Getting angry with a very young child only frightens him or her, and children

often interpret anger as a sign that the parent does not love them. The expression of will in a child is not something to be extinguished. In fact, attempts to do so may only produce a backlash, if not now, then in later years. Remember, the way you talk to your child now when you are upset or frustrated, may be the way he or she talks to you during adolescence. Be cautious about what you are modeling.

The R.M. of Edenwold called an emergency council meeting on May 9th to deal with the public feedback from the "Garage Suite" issue.

Actually, it was officially a Special Council Meeting. "Emergency meeting" is my terminology and I don't use the term lightly. "Public feedback" puts it mildly too. Outright public hostility is a more apt description of the reaction to a proposal to change Emerald Park's zoning by-law to allow residents to convert their garages into rental apartments.

The ball started rolling downhill on March 12th with first reading of a bylaw to amend the zoning by-law. What Council didn't know at the time was that there are four neighbourhoods in Emerald Park (St Andrews Bay, Hogan Place, Woods Crescent and New Bay) which are "contract zones" stipulating that only single family dwellings are permitted.

An agreement between Great Plains Leaseholds Ltd. and the RM of Edenwold signed in 2018 also stipulated that another large chunk of Emerald Park could only be developed as single-family dwellings.

Any attempt by the RM to force this type of zoning in breach of the "contracts" and the 2018 agreement

would likely have resulted in the mother of all lawsuits. Councillor Posehn (who tried to have this goofy plan taken off the table back in March) led off the discussion with a description of a May 3rd phone call advising her about the "contract" zones. (We can only speculate why the council wasn't made aware of the existence of these contracts, and the agreement between Great Plains and the RM, back in March before first reading of the bylaw was even con-

Posehn described the phone calls, emails, and petitions which she had been receiving from the public opposed to the plan. "Our reputation is on the line" is how she described any suggestion of the RM willfully breaching the "contracts."

sidered.)

Credit too, to councillor Leibel, who moved first reading back on March 12, for making the motion to rescind it once all of the facts were known and the public mood was determined.

If you say it fast, a home for Granny-in-the-Garage might seem appealing. But this was never about "Granny". It was about converting garages into apartments for who-knows-who.

A zoning by-law is an implied covenant between a municipality and the residents, present and future. Someone buying a home in Emerald Park has a right to expect stability in zoning regulations. Changing zoning, willy-nilly, would have been a breach of that covenant.

And when we consider the apartment block proposal on Great Plains Road (up to 842 new residents) and the Sector Plan Analysis finalized in June 2022 which would see eight currently undeveloped areas in Emerald Park designated

for higher density housing, there would seem to be no need for the higher density that would come with another family living in your neighbour's garage.


